








Blending- Once the children have learnt some sounds they

- He helps the children listen to the sounds and begin to blend words with out reading them.






Word time



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How can I help at home?

- Story time- Read to your children
- Ask lots of questions and share opinions.
- Talking
- Talk to your child as much as possible and 'feed' them new and ambitious vocabulary.
- Vocabulary-Enrich conversations through description Praise your child for using new words or interesting phrases

We don't set homework, but we do request that you hear your child read their school reading book to you a minimum of 3 times a week.

Make sure they are practising sounding out the words and blending them together. Help them if they get stuck, by sounding the word back
